


## CHAMPIONS CONSTRUCTIONS

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## DID YOU KNOW?

There are 46 location-based Wildlife Trusts in the UK, encouraging everyone – including schools – to take meaningful action for nature.

The aim is for wildlife and natural habitats to play a valued role in addressing the world's climate and ecological emergencies.



Encourage wildlife in your school grounds by:



-> Looking after existing (or planting new) flowers, shrubs and trees

- Letting the grass grow (in certain areas) to encourage wild flowers, bees and other insects
- -> Providing water, with a pond or a large pot or other container
- -> Building log and rock piles for insects, reptiles and amphibians


